<u>Our Week of Learning</u> End of Term Spring Term Review and Celebration



Year 1	What at busy term, we end our literacy journey with a look at poetry. The children enjoyed reading the po Five Little Senses All in a Row and a Five Senses Poem. We linked our ideas our science work on the weather.

	We used different ideas to describe the 5 different senses, adding in descriptive adjectives. The children enjoy reading then to each other and reading them aloud.
	In our science session we made rain gauges, we then put them in the in the KS1 garden, to catch the rain. Each day we went out and checked the amount of water collected and filled in the recording table. In Maths, we have been consolidating our knowledge of number to 50. We have noticed a huge
	improvement in the children's recall of the numbers to 20 and beyond. The children have begun to investigate a 100 square and the patterns they can find, counting in 2's, 5's, and 10's.
	We concluded our Topic work as weather forecasters, looking at the different weather symbols and telling each other the weather we might see at different times of the year or linking this to the different seasons.
Year 2	We finally had some sunshine for our last session of Outdoor Learning this term! Mr Pemble led the children on a phonetic Easter Egg hunt and the children worked together to include the words in their own sentences.

	In Maths, we have been consolidating our knowledge of multiplication and division with lots of games and activities. We have noticed a huge improvement in the children's recall of their times tables so a big thank you to all the parents who have been busy practising with them at home! We have finished our letter writing that was in reference to our book 'The Last Wolf.' The children wrote a persuasive letter to convince the reader to stop chopping down so many trees and why we need to protect them. Everybody has worked really hard these past few weeks and Mrs Andrews and I have been incredibly proud – Well Done Year 2!
Year 3	classroom on Wednesday afternoon for the children to share all their learning. It was so lovely to see so many of you here and I know the children were so excited to show you all that they have achieved over the last term. We all said a sad but fond farewell to Mrs Currie, though I am sure she will visit us in the future to see all of our new learning. We finished our English work by creating an acrostic poem all about Wolves and presenting these in a wolf shaped picture. I was very impressed with the technical language they remembered from writing their non-chronological report. In maths, we finished our fractions work by doing lots of problem-solving and the children used all of their new knowledge to reason and explain their findings. The children made some beautiful Easter cards using watercolours and then creating a poem, which I hope you will enjoy. They have all worked so hard this term and I am very proud of each and every one of you. I do hope you all have a lovely restful half term and I look forward to welcoming you back next term!
Year 4	We have completed the drafts of our autobiographies this week, the children worked hard to describe their way up Mount Everest. They have now begun to redraft and edit their writing, adding more detail, creating better sentences and checking punctuation and grammar. We have also written some beautiful alliterative poems about Easter and spring and turned them into cards for our families. On the front the children used their learning from art this term to draw an impressionist style daffodil in oil and soft pastels.

	In science, we looked at the processes of freezing, melting, condensation and evaporation. The children were able to show how the atoms behaved as they changed state and learnt the temperatures that water had to reach to change. We have been continuing our work on fractions in Maths. The children can now count up in mixed numbers and improper fractions. They can label missing fractions on number lines and name what mixed or improper fraction the bar models shows.
Year 5	or improper fraction the bar models shows. We have been zooming through our novel <i>Into the Volcano</i> , trying to finish before the end of term – it has
	been very exciting as the protagonists have come face to face with a grizzly bear in Yellowstone Park. The children have recorded their thoughts and feelings in role as one of the characters in some fantastic recount writing. In geography we have been learning about the significance of latitude and Longitude and the children can name all 5 of the major lines of Latitude and the major line of longitude (ask them). We have also been studying the Caribbean – looking at the islands and their main exports as well as the influences brought by both the Europeans and the Africans who were imported there to work as slaves. In maths we have smashed area and perimeter and in Art the children have loved experimenting with monotype printmaking. They have really enjoyed the process and have created some gorgeous collages of North American animals in their habitats using parts of the prints they have made.
	Congratulations to Leo Ford for having earned the Governor's cup award!
Year 6	First of all, I just want to send a huge congratulations to Connie for her recent accolade of wining the Governor's Award for Spring Term in Year 6. Connie has shown a great work ethic, determination and resilience in abundance throughout the year and has done so with a smile on her face – well done Connie, we are all very proud of you!
	Over the past fortnight, Year 6 have explored figurative language in their free verse poems based around their scientific learning of the human body's systems. The class have learnt new poetic devices and explored the importance of punctuation within poetry, before performing selected verses in groups to emphasis this learning. Lots of fun was had during these dramatic performances.

Within our topic work on Crime and Punishment, the class have looked back into Britain's past and learnt in chronological order the different practices, crimes and punishments that have taken place within the different eras. This week we have investigated the Stuarts, led by King James I, how society dealt with the hysteria surrounding witchcraft and the linked punishments. We looked specifically at the Pendle Witch Trials and used our reasoning and historical interpretation skills to analyse the details and repercussions
of them. In Maths, we have continued to forensically analyse our approach to assessments and be reflective learners with both going back over the completed tests and attend boosters. This has been very fruitful with excellent progress made – which has been shared and celebrated with the children. Exploring, estimating, measuring and calculating angles in different triangles and quadrilaterals has been our most recent focus alongside reasoning for more complex reasoning.

Equipment for the term

As we move into the summer term, and hopefully better weather, please can we ask that all children still have their wellington boots and a coat in school each day. We aim to be outside and on the school field as much as possible during lunch and playtimes. This helps us minimise the mud in the school buildings and manage our unpredictable climate.

I hope that you all have had a super Easter Holiday and we look forward to welcoming you back to school on Monday morning.
